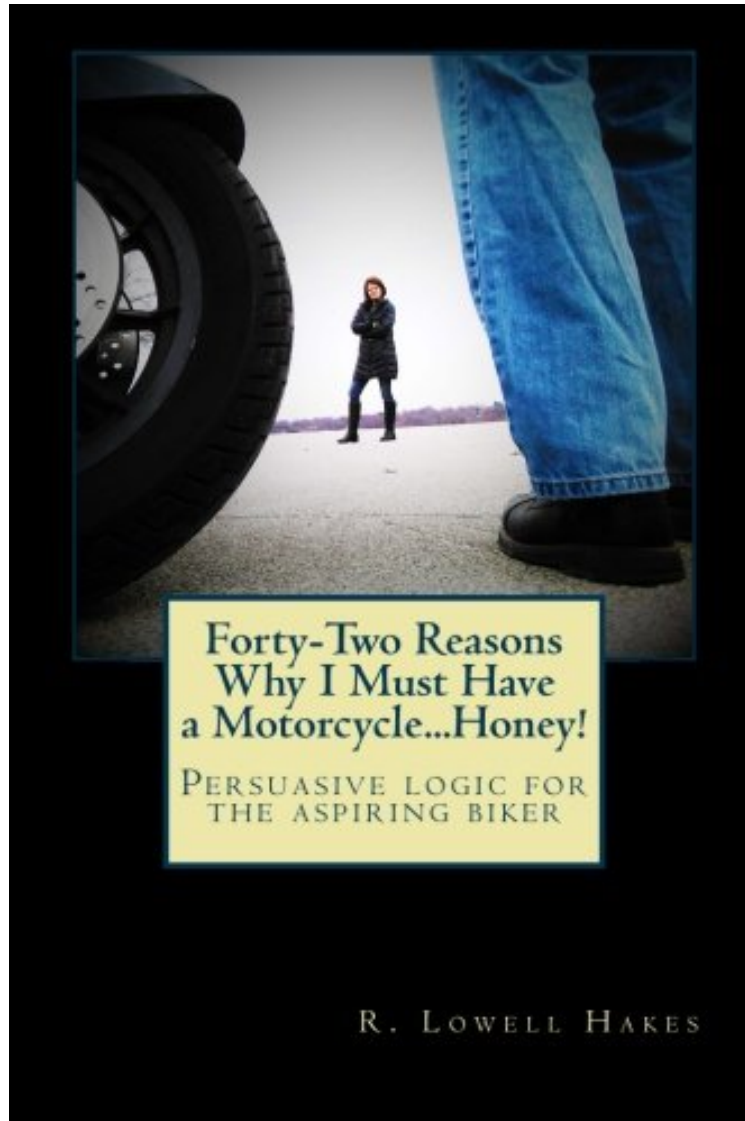

This short work is a fun, easy-reading, tongue-in-cheek relationship guide for aspiring bikers.
